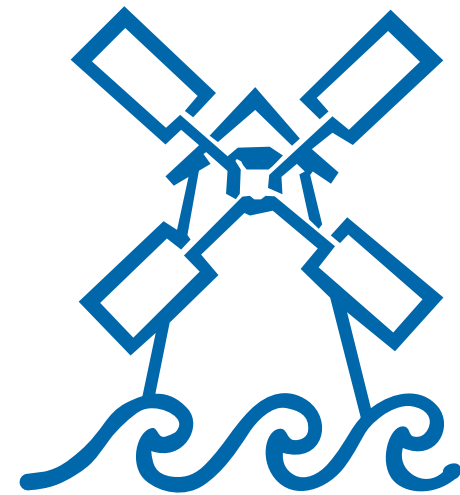

HISTORY AND PURPOSE

Mill Reef Fund is a charitable trust created in 1948 by founding members of the Mill Reef Club. Its mission is simply to improve the lives of the people of Antigua and Barbuda through donations to medical, educational, general welfare and religious institutions on the twin island nation.

PROGRAMS

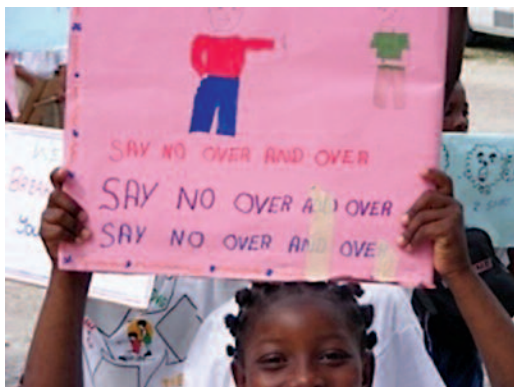
Medical and Health



Mill Reef Fund donates generously to Antigua's hospitals and clinics. In recent years, it has provided major medical equipment to Mount St. John's Medical Centre and the Adelin Clinic, and furnished a ward at St. John's Hospice. Since 2001, it has financed a drug prevention program administered by Crossroads Centre for children in all the primary schools. Fiennes Institute, a home for the elderly and disabled, is benefitting from a plan to provide diagnostic services and to bring mobility to wheelchair bound residents.

Education

In partnership with Hands Across the Sea, the Fund has installed libraries in primary and secondary schools as well as made donations of textbooks, computers and phonics software to improve literacy. It underwrote Antigua's first comprehensive screening and tutoring program for children with learning disabilities and has



since expanded the program. Recently, the Fund has contributed to an after-school sailing program to teach all aspects of seamanship and boating skills needed for employment in the vibrant Caribbean yachting industry. The Fund has supported training programs for teenage parents and for the blind. In an effort to promote entrepreneurial farming and environmental awareness, the Fund has donated to GARD, an ably run grassroots organization.

General Welfare

Donations have enabled community leaders to implement programs at a day care center for the elderly, a refuge for domestic abuse victims, a home for severely handicapped children, and for marine search and rescue missions. For many years, the Fund has financed a hot lunch program at a school for special needs children. It supports preservation and restoration projects of Antigua's historical sites. Annual donations to the Antigua Red Cross and the Salvation Army benefit their programs and provide money from a special reserve for emergency relief after hurricanes and tropical storms.



Religious

Annual donations support churches around the island as well as work of the Archdiocese of the Caribbean and the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. Additional monies have been given to St. Phillip's Church and the Anglican Cathedral in St. John's for major repairs after hurricanes.
